Vestry News

Some highlights from the November 26th meeting of the Vestry:

- **Pat Butler** reviewed plans for the 2008 Stewardship Program which included the naming of the Stewardship Committee by the December 17th Vestry Meeting, a parish-wide mailing by December 31st, visitations to all parishioners by a two members of the Stewardship Committee/Vestry, the dividing of the parish into “Villages”, i.e., concentrations of parishioners, a year round campaign, including the involvement of summer parishioners, the ability to make pledge payments on-line or through automatic debit accounts, an emphasis on “planned giving”, a goal of 100% participation, and an increase of \$35,000 to \$40,000 in annual pledges.

- **Jim Baird, Chairman of the Search Committee**, reviewed a Rector Compensation Survey the Diocese requires as part of the posting for an open position in the national church personnel system. The Vestry approved a motion accepting the completed survey and authorized forwarding the survey to the Diocese for its approval. (As of December 9, Mr. Baird reported that the Diocese did accept the completed survey and the official announcement of St. Peter’s opening has been posted on the national data base.)

- At **Sarah Horvath’s** recommendation, **Steve Lipman**, President of Cape Cod E Com, a firm specializing in web-site design, made a presentation and offered suggestions on possible improvements to the St. Peter’s web-site. Mr. Lipman is expected to provide a specific proposal by the December 17th Vestry meeting. Should the Vestry decide to accept Cape Cod E Com’s proposal, Jane Schaller, who currently maintains the parish web-site, has said that she will be pleased to work with the firm on this effort.

- **Treasurer Bill Seaward** reported the gifted receipt from **John and Kay Welsh** of 325 shares of Schering-Plough stock to be added to St. Peter’s Endowment Trust. The present value of the stock is approximately \$9,700.

- **Junior Warden David Bernard** reported that the Barnstable Board of Health has approved the corrected items and necessary upgrades noted in the board’s annual health inspection. The upgrades included the installation of hands-free faucets in the parish hall restrooms and kitchen (at a cost of \$5,000). Mr. Bernard also reported that the furnace failed in the Cottage and will be replaced by Carl Reidell Plumbing and Hearing Co. at a cost of \$3,300.

- **Fr. Bob Anthony** reported on his intention to establish a Circle of Prayer Partners group, and a Hospitality, an Arts, and Finance committees to serve specific needs of the parish. He also emphasized his recommendation the parish need for a “parish promotion communicator”—someone to publicize activities at St. Peter’s outside of the parish. In addition, based on a successful tradition in another parish, Fr. Anthony had previously suggested considering a “Parish Wish List”, i.e., a list of specific items or expenses, parishioners could choose to fund or contribute toward. The Vestry added several items to the initial list, and that list will be posted in the bulletin, Cross Keys, the web-site and on the bulletin boards. As of the dead-line of the newsletter, Fr. Anthony has given \$500 toward the purchase of vestments; **Debbie Gasior** has given \$500 toward the purchase of a commercial vacuum cleaner. **David Bernard** also reported that an anonymous donor has offered to pay for the cost of cleaning and painting the exterior trim of the church. A quote of \$5,000 has been received for that work.

- **Carole Dwyer** said that the final accounting of the Harvest Fair will be made at the December Vestry meeting.

- **Lynn Voccola** noted that the homeless overnights will begin again, and that St. Peter’s is next

scheduled to house women from the NOAH Shelter on December 24th. In lieu of staying at St. Peter's that night, the Vestry authorized the expenditure of approximately \$300 from the Outreach account to house the women at an area motel for the evening.

• **Senior Warden Bill Carlton** reported that **Bill Seaward, Ron Reed, Robin Rowland and Paul Soares** have agreed to serve on the 2008 Finance Committee, and that **David Bernard** has again offered to pay for the cost of the biennial parish financial audit.

The next Vestry meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. Monday, December 17th. Parishioners are invited to attend.

Notes on Convention 2007

The weekend of November 2nd and 3rd I attended the Diocesan Convention as your representative. It happened to be the 222nd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts. It was held at the Best Western on Route 2 in Fitchburg. A far cry from the stately and majestic Trinity Church, Copley Square! But, it really didn't matter, the Spirit was everywhere and it was a very uplifting experience.

I arrived about 6:00 pm on Friday evening where a cocktail reception was just getting underway in the lobby. Ah, it's great to be an Episcopalian! Besides running into Hilary Greene as I was checking in, I quickly realized that I knew no one there. Far different from the late seventies and early eighties when I was last a delegate and I seemed to know everyone. After a quick trip to my room to unpack, I returned to join the party. As I was looking over the crowd of strangers, I happened to see a man who I recognized as someone who used to work on the same floor of the same office building in Boston as I, but for a different company - curious coincidence.

His name is Dain Perry and he introduced me to his wife Constance and a man they had been talking to who looked vaguely familiar. He was Jeb Streit, Dean of the Cathedral. Dain and Constance are parishioners of Trinity Church, Copley Square. They have been involved in documenting the slave trade and the way the American north, not just the south, was involved in slavery. This has become their vocation. They created a film that they have shown to countless organizations including many parishes both within and outside of the Episcopal Church. It was shown at the 75 General Convention. I sat with them at dinner and was joined by a couple of diocesan staffers. It turns out that Constance is a member of the Standing Committee.

Also joining us was Charles Wibiralske from the Episcopal City Mission. I learned that the Episcopal City Mission has moved beyond working only in the inner city. He told me that they have been working in partnership with St. Mary's Barnstable working with the Brazilian community in Hyannis, among other things, making low interest loans to help establish businesses. He expressed an interest in having St. Peter's join that partnership. I was reminded of that old saying that goes something like this: "Give a man a fish and he eats for a day. Teach him how to fish and he eats for a lifetime." Across the table sat the new Rector from Provincetown, Terry Pannell. Unfortunately, he was too far away to strike up a conversation.

The dinner was a benefit dinner to support our Gulf Coast partnerships. The Diocese has been very active working in the Gulf Coast area since Katrina. It was a New Orleans themed event resplendent with purple, gold, and green everything, including beads. There was a Jazz Band that struck up "When the Saints Come Marching Home" to accompany a colorful parade led by our bishops. After the delicious dinner there was a brief auction which included a baseball signed by Jonathan Papelbon which went for about \$600 and a Patriots helmet signed by Tom Brady that brought in over \$800. You can get a sense of the mood of the crowd when, what started as a joke, they auctioned off a pair Bishop Bud's red socks - that he assured us were freshly laundered - and they brought in \$300! The next day they announced that the event had raised over \$22,000 for the Gulf Coast partnerships.

The next morning, since I normally arise at 4:00 am to go to work, I enjoyed sleeping in. I got up at 6:00, showered, shaved, got dressed, and was just finishing packing when the fire alarm went off! I dutifully trudged down the stairs with everyone else and gathered in the lobby. It seems that I was one of the few that was already up. I faced a sea of disheveled hair, puffy eyes, and a wide array of sleeping attire. It seems that someone had burned the French toast. After the all clear from the fire department everyone went back to their rooms. I went to breakfast.

At breakfast, I got talking to the woman at the table next to mine who turned out to be Helen Gordon from St. Barnabas in Falmouth. Helen commented that it seemed that it was only the Cape people who were up early. She told me that she had created a new web site for St. Barnabas as well as the Cape & Islands Deanery. She has been developing a web cast capability that would enable someone, for example, to participate in a Deanery meeting - live - though their home computer.

That would save time, not to mention gas! She wondered who our web master was. I didn't know. It also turns out that she was bunking with an old friend of mine, Connie Melahoures from Christ Church in Plymouth. Connie joined us at breakfast. Connie and I served together in a number of church positions at Christ Church. I succeeded her as Senior Warden. It was great catching up.

The day's official activities began at 8:30 am with a Eucharist Service. We were lead in the processional hymn by a cantor with piano accompaniment. We no sooner finished the hymn and Bishop Shaw began with the Opening Sentences when the fire alarm went off again. No wonder the place was only \$89 a night! We quickly learned that it was a false alarm, but that it would take the fire department about ten minutes to get there and turn the alarm off. What to do? We sang hymns of course. After the fire alarm interruption, the Service continued. It was very moving and included a "meditation" by Bishop Shaw. Very powerful.

After the Service, the Legislative Session began.

The Convention voted to Amend the Diocesan Constitution to change the number of voting delegates each parish can send to Convention. Prior to this amendment, parishes had either one, two, or three voting delegates depending on the size of the parish. The amendment gave each parish two voting delegates – no change for St. Peter's. In addition, they voted to allow lay members of the Diocesan Council the right to vote at convention. Several other proposed changes were essentially withdrawn.

Next we dealt with a number of Resolutions proposed by various clergy and lay people in the Diocese. The first was a resolution urging the defeat of any legislation allowing for the expansion of gambling in the Commonwealth. After much discussion, the submitters chose to withdraw the proposal.

Then there was a proposed resolution on a new geographical reference for Bernard Mizeki, Catechist and Martyr. The resolution sought to change his geographical reference from Rhodesia to Zimbabwe. After much discussion, including an observation that there are numerous others whose references to place names vary from the current names, the resolution was defeated.

One of the more interesting resolutions related to the US Military's recruitment practices in high schools, and, allegedly, specifically targeting inner city schools and minorities. I must admit an issue I knew nothing about. From the discussion I learned that the military routinely goes into high schools in an effort to recruit high school seniors. Some speakers questioned their high pressure tactics. Interestingly, a number of high school students spoke against the resolution stating that the recruiters were active in their suburban schools as well and that they saw nothing wrong with presenting alternative options, and serving your country. The resolution was ultimately withdrawn.

Before breaking for lunch, there was a presentation on our work in the Gulf Coast and what a difference it was making in so many lives in the area. There was also a presentation about the Diocese of Jerusalem and the difficult work it is doing among Palestinian Christians in the midst of the turmoil of the Middle East.

While all of the above was going on, I was sitting four rows back with delegates from St. Mary's Barnstable including Hilary and their Rector, Steven Smith. The three rows in front of me were filled with about forty members of the Diocesan Youth Council which I couldn't help but notice. They were like high school kids everywhere: they had trouble sitting still and they ate and drank constantly. But, what I also noticed was the way they interacted with each other. They clearly knew each other – well. From the hugs and high-fives it was clear that they had bonded. There was truly a sense of acceptance, caring and love. This was a diverse group from all over the diocese: boys and girls, black, white and other shades, from inner city and suburban high schools and at least one who attended Philips Andover. One boy was wearing a jacket that read "Sandwich Soccer" so there was at least one from the Cape. I remember when Bishop Shaw visited with us at St. Peter's several years ago, he spoke about the need to dramatically improve our Youth Ministry and how important it was to the future of the church. I think I was witnessing the fruits of that labor.

Lunch was a time to mingle (box lunches eaten standing up in the hotel lobby), checking out the various exhibits by church organizations and getting a weather update about Noel. Some clergy from the islands had already left fearing that the ferries would stop running.

The after lunch session started with a brief Service and another “meditation” from Bishop Shaw. Afterwards, we had a presentation from the Rev. Robert Bacon, Director, Youth Ministries who reported on the tremendous success of the youth programs. He spoke about the Diocesan Youth Council (“DYC”) and the Youth Leadership Academy (“YLA”) and the Barbara Harris Camp and Conference Center (“BHC”). He spoke about mission trips these kids have taken to the Gulf Coast and El Salvador. He spoke of the need to strengthen our college and young adult ministries and the need to expand the BHC which is already too small. He told that last night these kids stayed at the local Episcopal church in Fitchburg. How they ate lots of pizza and played a lot of games and then they worshiped for two hours. They focused on Bishop Shaw’s Friday “meditation” and how to best serve. He then introduced a young man, Sam Gould, a former member of the DYC, a graduate of the YLA and current Stanford freshman. He was very impressive. After his remarks, Hilary turned to me and asked, “What do you think – a future bishop?”

Jeb Streit, Dean of St. Paul’s Cathedral reported on the radio ministry of the cathedral and that about 15,000 people listen to the Sunday morning broadcast at 7:30 each Sunday. I believe he stated that it is the longest running religious broadcast and was begun in 1923. He shared some comments they had received from their listeners.

The Elections Committee then reported the results of the election of delegates to the General Convention in 2009. We elected four clergy delegates: The Rev. Gail Morris, Church of the Good Shepherd, Acton; The Rev. Mally Lloyd, Christ Church, Plymouth; The Rev. Ian Douglas, St. James’ Church, Cambridge; and, The Rev. Jane Gould, St. Stephen’s Church, Lynn. We also elected four lay delegates: Mr. Samuel Gould, St. Stephen’s Church, Lynn (son of the Rev. Jane Gould and the speaker mentioned above); The Hon. Byron Rushing, St. John St. James, Roxbury; Ms. Rebecca A. Alden, St. David’s Church, South Yarmouth; and, Mr. Richard Vanderlippe, Trinity Church, Concord.

The last major item of business was the approval of the Diocesan Budget. The Budget was the primary topic of preliminary meetings held around the diocese prior to Convention. It was approved in two parts. The first was the Parish Assessments and the second the Budget. Both were overwhelmingly approved with no discussion.

We then closed with some prayers and a blessing and headed out in the stormy weather thanks to Noel.

Forgive me if this report seems long, but I wanted to give you a sense of the event itself, the vitality of this Diocese and the good that we are doing together in God’s name as this Diocese. I came away with a few thoughts for the Parish and the Vestry:

1. I encourage anyone interested, to run for election as a delegate to the Diocesan Convention. It is a great experience.
2. I encourage others in the parish to attend. The convention is open to others from the parish who wish to observe. You may not have voice or be able to vote, but you can participate in the larger life of the Church.
3. I encourage the youth of this parish, junior high and senior high, to become involved in the diocesan youth programs. You can learn more from their website: www.diomassyouth.org.
4. I encourage the Vestry to explore the feasibility of participating in the partnership between the Episcopal City Mission and St. Mary’s with the Brazilian community in Hyannis.
5. I would ask the Vestry if they think there would be any parish interest in a presentation from the Perry’s on the slave trade, perhaps at an adult ed session.

In closing, I want to thank you for the opportunity to represent you at the larger gathering of our church. If anyone has any questions, or would like more information, please feel free to contact me.
